We are hopeful the parties were encouraging for the residents as they work through the difficulty of separation from their families during the holiday season.

During this time of year, the separation from family is truly felt. Some do not have family to call and talk

to, and it is truly harder for them. For those who do have family that continues to support them through this time of incarceration, it is hard, but at the same time, much easier to do "time".

In some institutions there will be "special" menus created just for the holidays. This meal will be as close to a holiday meal as is

feasible. In some, its just another day on the calendar.

Often times, churches will have special services either on Christmas Eve or Christmas morning. I have actually been in both. In one we actually had a Christmas Eve candlelight service that was actually later in the evening.

There are many things that you may be thinking about in the coming days. I ask you to think about, and pray for those men and women who can not be with family at this time.

For 28 years while I was in prison, my family was there for me and I tried to make the best that I could, not only for me, but those around me.

There were two Christmas Programs that I never

missed, It's A Wonderful Life, and Charlie Brown Christmas.

> You see, I often thought about what life would've been like if I were not here. I related to George Bailey, of course different circumstances, but same thinking. Now, I used to watch this movie before allowing my addictions to get the best of me and going to prison. But it really made sense after being in prison. I got it. I


saw the big picture. I had a guardian angel like Clarence to show me my life.

I would like to share the story of the Birth of Christ just as Linus did so many years ago.
